Monitoring (OECD DAC)

- Continuing function
- Uses systematic collection of data on specified indicators
- Provides management and main stakeholders with indications of
 - Extent of progress and achievement of objectives
 - Use of allocated funds.



External Monitoring

- Independently review and report on performance
 - Review Baseline Data, progress reports and performance information
 - Undertake regular field visits
 - Participate in Committee meetings
 - Technical facilitation/capacity building
 - Provide advice on technical implementation



Why do agencies use external project monitors?

- Range of technical competencies required
- Shortage of staff → outsource some aspect of quality control
 - Especially: large, complex projects in high risk environments
- Support capacity development on roll out of RBM



What's the difference?

- External Monitoring
 - Ongoing
 - Formative
 - Comment on project documents
 - Shorter reports
 - Recommendations specific, practical, immediate

- External Evaluation
 - One time event
 - Formative or summative
 - Use project documents to evaluate
 - More primary data collection
 - Broader recommendations



External Monitoring: The bright side

- Outside View
- In depth knowledge of the investment
- Cumulative results tracking
- Mentoring/capacity development
- Mediation function
- Create opportunity for reflection
- Shape project directions



External Monitoring: Limitations and Challenges

- Role and responsibilities often not clearly defined
- Stuck between the fronts
- Loss of distance
- Visits often burden for project teams
- Is information & advice being used?



Current Trends

- Paris Declaration Context
 - Shift towards programs/sectors & multilateral agencies
 - **→** Fewer bilateral projects
 - Emphasis on local ownership/leadership
 - → Fewer Northern Executing Agencies
- Fewer external monitors used/needed
- But: Continued or even growing emphasis on accountability



Conclusions

- External monitoring in its old form becoming obsolete?
- But: Potentially valuable lessons from ext.
 monitoring experiences to date
- Elements of the concept can be helpful in new development context
 - Involved but distanced observer/advisor
 - "Critical Friend"
